



# Living World Mission Rosary Prayer Activity




## What is a Living World Mission Rosary?

A Living World Mission Rosary is a prayer activity where each student represents a country or continent, and together, the school community prays the rosary for children and missionaries around the world. It's a visual, interactive way for students to see the global Church and unite their prayers for missions.

### 1. Preparation

- Choose a Date & Location
- Ideally during October (Mission Month)
- Can be held in the school gym, chapel, or courtyard.



### 2. Gather Materials

- A large map or world globe
- Colored ribbons, beads, balloons or t-shirts representing each of the 5 mission areas:
  - Green – Africa
  - Red – Americas
  - White – Europe
  - Blue – Oceania
  - Yellow – Asia
- Optional: Name tags cards or small flags for each country/continent in the assigned Mission Area

### 3. Assign Roles

- Each student (or group) represents a country or Mission area represented on the World Mission Rosary
- Assign a student to hold each “bead” or symbol.
- Consider having older students lead the prayers while younger children hold the beads or flags.

### Tips for Success

- Use visuals: maps, flags, or a globe help children see the global Church.
- Keep it interactive: let younger children hold symbols or flags, and older students lead prayers.
- Encourage reflection: after the rosary, students can write a short note or draw a picture of a missionary or child they prayed for.
- Combine it with a classroom discussion on the MCA, St. Thérèse of Lisieux, or the lives of missionaries to reinforce the connection between prayer and action.



# Living World Mission Rosary Prayer Activity



## 1. Opening Prayer

Begin with a short prayer for children and missionaries around the world.

Example: "Lord Jesus, bless all the children and missionaries around the world. Help us to share Your love and be Your hands and hearts wherever we are. Amen."

## 2. Explain the Rosary

- Briefly explain the structure: decades, mysteries, and intentions.
- Introduce the "Living" aspect: students will hold symbols representing countries/continents in the special mission areas represented by the World Mission Rosary as each decade is prayed.

## 3. Assign the Mysteries

- For a traditional rosary, there are five decades:
- Assign each decade a Mission Area
- Students holding that Mission Area's symbol come forward to the front or hold up their ribbon/flag.
- Optional: for older students, assign specific mission intentions for each mission areas (e.g., children in need, missionaries, peace, education).

## 4. Pray the Rosary Together

- Lead the Our Father, Hail Marys, and Glory Be as usual.
- Encourage students to pray silently for children and missionaries in the country/continent they represent. Utilize the monthly MCA Project Worksheets for special intentions.
- Rotate students as needed to include everyone.

## 5. Closing Prayer & Reflection

Thank God for all children and missionaries around the world.

Invite students to share one thing they learned about missions or one prayer intention they have for children globally.

**Optional:** Sing a mission-themed hymn or song.

## Optional Extension Activities

- Mission Stations: Set up stations around the school representing different continents with prayer cards, artifacts, or pictures.
- Prayer Wall: Have students write their prayers for children around the world on sticky notes and place them on a large map or bulletin board.
- Living Rosary Display: Take a photo of all students holding their continent symbols to share with the school community or MCA newsletter.
